Background

Since February 2022, more than 4 million people from Ukraine, mostly women and children, have registered for temporary protection across Europe.¹ Based on the Council Decision and Directive 2001/55/EC (the 'Temporary Protection Directive'), the legislative provisions have immediately ensured their access to education, health and social services as well as the job market. The European Commission, in consultation with the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), the United Nations High Commissioners for Refugees (UNHCR), representatives of Ministries of Education, and stakeholder organisations jointly developed recommendations for the educational inclusion and integration of refugee children across all ages in EU countries for the school year 2022-23. Since then, about 800,000 children have obtained access to national education systems of the EU member states.²

Despite various supports provided across the host countries almost over the past 2 years, a number of challenges and barriers still remain. They include shortages of classrooms and learning spaces; language barriers and lack of teaching and learning materials; insufficient qualified and competent teachers, teaching assistants and caregivers; mental health and wellbeing of children, families and teachers/staff; bullying and discrimination; financial pressures and lack of social networks, especially among adolescents and young people to name a few. A critical question is how we can collectively address these challenges to ensure that all Ukrainian children and young people continuously access inclusive quality education and learning opportunities during these difficult times, wherever they may be.

Rationale

The Czech Republic, with its presidency of the <u>Visegrad Group 2023/2024</u>, prioritizes the "Support to Ukraine" as one of its 3 pillars, and proposes that "[t]he Czech Presidency will support the integration of Ukrainians into the educational systems of the V4 countries through sharing best practices and experience". In this context, the Czech Ministry of Education, Youth and Sports and UNICEF, under the auspices of the Human Rights Commissioner Klára Šimáčková Laurenčíková, will jointly organise a **Regional Education Conference** with the aim of facilitating cross-country sharing of emerging good practices. The organisers also wish that this forum will contribute to strategic discussions around the broader goal of inclusive quality education for all with regards to the European Education Area and other regional frameworks and commitments. Lessons from

the current refugee response will provide valuable insights into the inclusive quality education and learning of the most marginalized children such as children with disabilities, Roma children, and children from poorest households.

Expected Outcomes and Objectives

The conference conclusions are expected to inform the work of policymakers, senior officials, experts, and practitioners thereby facilitating development and implementation of each country's action plans/roadmaps for inclusive quality education system through key investments and programmes.

Outcome 1: Host countries inspired to further include Ukrainian refugee children in national education systems

- » To provide a strategic and open forum of stocktaking and exchange of policies as well as lessons between policymakers, senior officials, academia, and practitioners on the inclusion of Ukrainian refugees (e.g. legislation, coordination, financing, workforce development etc.).
- » To identify and share innovative measures, tools, and practices to support the Ukrainian children, including young children and adolescents, to quickly develop language skills in the context of the whole school approach, catch-up programmes, and recognition of competencies, skills, and qualifications.

Outcome 2: EU education systems enhanced cooperation with the Ukrainian MoES to facilitate continuous learning of the Ukrainian children and future recovery of the country.

- » To identify strategies for improving exchange of information about the students, education systems, curricula and workforce across the countries.
- » To discuss frameworks and tools for recognising skills and competencies as well as education/school certificates across the countries.
